Goorge W. Hans, one of the pioneer citizens of Kiasimmee and known throughout this section of Florida, lied Wednesday morning, August 26, Mer a short illness. He was buried Wadnesday afternoon in Rosebill company, after a funeral service at the home conducted by Rev. S. W. Lawler, his pasto. Mr. Bans was neventy years old, bore January 1, 1844, near Americus, Ga. His parents moved to Florida when he was two years old and settled must the present site of Kissimmer, then in Brevard oninty. He was married to Mrs. Susannah Saraberry, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. J. H. Sanberry, of Durlington, S. C., on April J. 1868. Seven children blessed this union, two passing away in childhood, The widow and five remain, W. C. Bass and Mrs. J. L. Overstreet, of this city, Murgan Bans, of Mulberry, Mrs. Pesk, of Carie, Ga., and Fulwood Bass.

In 1869 Mr. Bass moved to South Carolina, but returned to Kinsimmes in 1872, and has resided bare since. He united with the Mehodist church in 1873, and has been an active worker in the church since, having taken part in the building of four Methodist houses in and bear Kinsimmes.
