## GEO. BASS, PIONEER CITIZEN, IS DEAD

George W. Bass, one of the pioneer citizens of Kiamistee and known throughout this section of Florida, died Wednesday morning, August 26, after a short illness. He was buried Wednesday afternoon in Rosehill cemetery, after a funeral service at the home conducted by Rev. S. W. Lawler, his pastor. The Masons took charge of the service at the grave, and the body was interred with Masonic honors.

Mr. Bass was seventy years old, born January 1, 1844, near Americus, Ga. His parents moved to Florida when he was two years old and settled near the present site of Kiamistee, then in Brevard county. He was married to Miss Susannah Sansberry, daughter of Rev. and Mrs. J. H. Sansberry, of Darlington, S. C., on April 3, 1868. Seven children blessed this union, two passing away in childhood. The widow and five remain, W. C. Bass and Mrs. J. L. Overstreet, of this city, Morgan Bass, of Mulberry, Mrs. Peck, of Carle, Ga., and Fulwood Bass, of Tampa.

In 1869 Mr. Bass moved to South Carolina, but returned to Kiamistee in 1872, and has resided here since. He united with the Methodist church in 1874, and has been an active worker in the church since, having taken part in the building of four Methodist houses in and near Kiamistee.

Mr. Bass was one of eight brothers, all of whom lived in this section of the state and reared large families. He was widely connected, and the large attendance at his funeral included people from over the entire county.

## Board of Trade's New Secretary; Downtown Office

The Board of Trade at its meeting, through an amendment to its constitution, consolidated the offices of secretary and treasurer, and after the resignation of the men holding these offices, J. W. Prentiss was elected to the joint office of secretary-treasurer.

This action was taken after the former secretary, C. F. Johnson, and the treasurer, A. E. Thomas, had expressed a desire to resign, stating that their other duties hindered work they would otherwise like to do for the Board and which they considered should be done.

Mr. Prentiss, who accepted the new joint office, has room at his place of business on Broadway to give space to a Board of Trade desk, thus establishing headquarters where the Board's records, literature and like information can be kept, and where persons interested in the affairs of the board can make inquiries. Mr. Prentiss says that at any time during the store's regular hours some one will be on hand to answer these inquiries and as far as possible the desk will be made an efficient "information" bureau concerning the resources and possibilities of both city and county. Strangers will be made welcome and the Board of Trade will keep a stock of stationery on hand to accommodate people who care to use the desk as a writing table and address communications from that point.

By this arrangement the board will be able to enlarge its scope of work and be of real benefit to citizens and to strangers coming into the city all
