**Cornelius Johns** 

Cornelius Johns was born in North Carolina in the late 1700's. He moved to Florida before 1817. He married Elizabeth Sparkman in 1818, at Boggy Swamp Nassau County FL.

Cornelius Johns (Sr.) is listed in Florida records as having received a Spanish Land Grant (Alachua Co. Gen. site has documents) William Sparkman, his b-i-l also received a land grant. Cornelius had several son's, two were Burb(Bourbon) also spelled "Birb" in records and Cornelius Jr. who married Maria Alvarez (1st) then Rebecca Sylvester Barber (filed for widow's pension in FL) Cornelius & Burb are buried at Oak Ridge Cemetery in Orlando, FL on Sandlake Rd. Marzella Keene, Burb's wife is also buried there along with several of the subsequent generations. Cornelius son's are scattered, Andrew Jackson Johns and his wife Rebecca Patrick Johns are buried at Lake Hill Cemetery in Orlavista, FL on Old Winter Garden Rd. (Cary Hand Cemetery records are available at centralfloridamemoryproject.com) Issac Johns and his wife are buried at Ft. Ogden, FL and a third is buried at Greenwood Cemetery in Orlando, FL. Cornelius' first wife Maria died and is believed to be buried in Putnam Co. Cornelius Sr. and William Sparkman were close friends with Andrew Jackson and served under him during the War of 1812. There are documents in the Alachua archives with their signatures to do with the formation of the State of Florida. #### Ft Mitchell FL 1814 (Posted by Cliff Johns (20 Apr 2018)

In January of 1814 three Johns brothers, William, Isaac and Cornelius, all sons of Jacob Johns and Patience Wells of Colleton Co SC, joined a band of 125 men, mostly from Ga, and established Ft Mitchell in Alachua Co Fl in what was then East Spanish Florida (Fl didn't become a state until 1845), They all signed a petition to the President asking for aid in establishing Florida as a territory of America. I have this document in my files.

Ft Mitchell was a 25 by 25 square foot, two story blockhouse built about one half mile outside the city limits of present day Micanopy on a place called Payne's Prairie, the site of an Indian village and chief's headquarters. It was uncharted territory and very dangerous.

Ft Mitchell was abandoned in May of that year when no support was forthcoming. It passed unnoticed into history as a result. Seven years later many of the men came back to homestead the fertile land that they so loved.

All three Johns men went on to become among the earliest pioneers of Florida, although in various places.

A veteran of War of 1812 and a soldier in the Patriot War. In the District of Elatchaway, Fort Mitchell, East Florida, Cornelius was one of the 104 signers of the Petition to Congress for annexation of Florida for the United States from Spain. Posted by Cliff Johns 12 June 2012: Jacob Johns 1723/24, son of Isaac Johns and Ann Galloway of Anne Arundel/Calvert Co Md, is known to have "lately came" to SC from Md by his 1754 Petition for Land in SC cited here. He is evidently single at this time as he petitions only for 50 acres (100 was the norm for married couples), which is listed in the Memorial and in the Dutch Fork SC Book. The dates, names of bounding land owners, etc are the same in both documents. We know he was married to Patience by 1770 because of the deed cited to Warner Tucker. Also in 1769 Benjamin Wells conveys to Jacob and Patience the 100 acres cited. We know that Jacob was born prior to 1740 as determined by the age of his daughter Mary Johns Roden who appears in the Lowndes Co Ga 1850 census p. 402 at the age of 90. We also know that he was dead by 1813 as the SC land plat for Charles Jones in Colleton Co SC shows bounding land as "Est. of Jacob Johns". There is also a notation in the 1800 SC census for "John, Jacob B. Estate, St James, Santee" on page 177. If Jacob died in 1800 it seems likely <u>that Patience lived on the property until 1817 when her children moved to Ga</u> and the land was sold. It appears that Patience was much younger than her husband Jacob.

Patience Johns' maiden name has long been a question mark for even the most diligent researchers, including myself, and two deceased comrades, Vera Mallon and Burt Johns. In 1770 when they sold their 100 acres to Warner Tucker the deed clearly states that Benjamin Wells conveyed the land to them as an "estate of inheritance". I find the info pretty conlusive, as follows:

SC deed abstracts 1773-1778 - 22Nov1770 Jacob Johns and his wife Patience to Warner Tucker "The said grant of 100 acres has been made from Benjamin Wells to said Jacob Johns....that is to say said Jacob and Patience Johns now and is until the Execution etc. ...shall stand seized of good and Pure perfect and Indefeasible estate of inheritance." In the SC Memorials land registered to Jacob Johns and conveyed from Benjamin Wells there is no mention that the land was sold to him (it was granted). This evidence seems to say that Patience was the daughter of Benjamin Wells and wife Mary as the land was an inheritence and was not sold.

Patience could neither read nor write, evidently, since she had her name

misspelled (spelled Pashents) on the 23 Jan 1817 deed which she signed with her

mark. However, they had 11 children and established an estate of some 646

acres south of Charleston near Hilton Head. Too bad their heirs sold it for \$600

in 1817.

From FindAGrave Contributor Cliff Johns: "Richard Johns was born in Bristol, England, in 1649, and came to Maryland in his young manhood, the first patent to him for land there, "Rattlesnake Hill," being issued in 1674. He resided on first coming to Maryland with Friends and became convinced in their faith and principles, and later became an eminent minister of the Society. A Monthly Meeting was held at his house near the Cliffs in Calvert County, upwards of thirty years. Like many of the sect he shunned public office; declining to serve in the Colonial Legislature after having been elected to that body. He died December 16, 1717. He married, in 1676, Elizabeth, widow of Thomas Sparrow"



#### SUPPLEMENT TO THE JOHNS FAMILY HISTORY

Since the Johns family ancestral land tracts lay in Colleton County, SC, and since all Colleton County court records were burned in 1865 by the Union Army, I concluded that I had reached the end of the trail in pursuing any further information about the Jacob Johns family's land acquisitions in colonial South Carolina. After all, we had almost miraculously found the Jacob Johns deed only because the purchaser, Frederick Shupard, lived in neighboring Barnwell County and because their records survived the Civil War. It was only by sheer accident that a Johns researcher, Vera Mallon of Lakeland, found the deed there while researching another line.

Nevertheless, yesterday I decided to browse through the early SC Land Tract plat records, and to my complete surprise I found not only Jacob's survey but at least six more by his sons. The job is not finished yet, but the major ones are included here - they are just too rare to keep to myself any longer.

These documents completely authenticate the genealogy recorded on the Jacob Johns deed abstract that I included in the Johns Family History, first edition. A careful examination of these surveys reveals that Isaac, the second oldest son, not Jacob the father, was the first Johns to survey land in the forks of the Great Salkehatchie River in Charleston District (now Colleton County) on 5 Aug 1793, a 94 acre tract. Jacob, as we already know, did not have his land surveyed until 28 Jan 1797, some three and a half years later, possibly on his son's recommendation. We also learned that John T. Johns, the eldest son, had already gone further inland to the Rives Branch of the Edisto River in the Orangeburg District having his land surveyed on 9 Mar 1789. Nothing further is known about John at this time.

These surveys also show that William Johns, our direct ancestor, sold his land , 183 acres, in the forks of the Salkehatchie River to his brother, Levi, 19 Feb 1800, which is when he went south to Camden County, Ga. We know that his son, William Jr., was born there in 1801, that he was on the tax rolls for 1809, as was Levi, who evidently decided to follow his brother again.

A summary of these surveys provides the following chronology:

John T. Johns survey - 9 Mar 1789 - 260 a. Orangeburg District Isaac Johns survey - 5 Aug 1793 - 94 a. on forks of Salkehatchie Isaac Johns survey - 24 Nov 1796, 207 a. Sedare Br. " Jacob Johns survey - 28 Jan 1797, 346 a. great fork of " Isaac Johns survey - 31 Jan 1797, 246 a. forks of S.at Cross Swamp Wm. Johns survey - 19 Feb 1800, 183 a. forks of Big&Little S. Wm. Johns survey - 20 Apr 1811, 300a. on Great PeeDee River, Marlborough District. (Doesn't fit the migratory pattern. But this is the same William who travelled through Indian lands to the Mississippi Territory in 1803 and again in 1804). Not confident in accuracy prior to Richard Johns (above lines) and have not been able to verify but documenting here for future study. Based on the Granger family tree and work done by a Linda Bates has the following:
